

Keynote Address: THE IMPORTANCE OF AN EDUCATOR: How you as a preschool teacher can truly make a difference in the lives of a child and in the lives of a family.

She has a BS in Microbiology with a minor in Chemistry and a BA in English from Virginia Tech, a law degree from the Delaware Law School, and a Masters in Clinical Mental Health from Lenoir-Rhyne University. Paula is licensed to practice law in North Carolina, Georgia, and before the United States Patent and Trademark Office. She is a licensed Clinical Mental Health Counselor in North Carolina. Paula has been the Chair of Cabarrus County's Child Protection and Fatality Team for the last 10 years. She is also the founder of Cabarrus Apple Cart, a political action committee solely focused on getting good people appointed to the school board. Additionally, she is a certified yoga instructor, an avid reader of books, and is currently working on a historical fiction novel which she hopes to be able to release in the next year. Paula has been married to her husband Peter for 13 years and is the mother of three boys, Pratley, age 8, Pierson, age 6, and Paul age 4. She also has an adult daughter who was adopted from foster care and a granddaughter who is 4.

105 - Music & Lyrics: Enriching Language Development Through Song

Greek philosopher Plato remarked: "Music gives soul to the universe, wings to the mind, [and] flight to the imagination." We experience this idea daily in our interactions with the soundscape that surrounds us. This presentation explores how music can be implemented in education activities to target language skills by examining how to utilize songs, visuals, and other adaptive materials to foster vocabulary and concept development in children with Autism Spectrum Disorder and other language disorders.

Breakout Sessions 1 (continued)

106 - Supporting Students with FASD: Strategies for Educators Kim Mork, Supervisor of Behavioral Health Focus Group: All

In this presentation, participants will learn about Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder and how it affects a fetus in utero, how it impacts brain development and common behavior issues. Personal stories of working with families will be shared and specific strategies for the classroom that can help with children's behavior.

107- Circle Time: Where Learning Takes Shape

An effectively run, developmentally appropriate circle time is a wonderful time to learn new things, gain self- and emotional-regulation skills, and to allow children to share their learning/knowledge. 110 - Vicarious Trauma: How to deal with trauma you've experienced while helping others Natalie Atwell, Ed.D - Owner of Concord Counseling/Consulting: Licensed Clinical Mental Health Counselor; Professor Liberty University

In this presentation, participants will learn about vicarious trauma (trauma experienced by caregivers of those with trauma. Participants will learn strategies for how to manage their own stress as a result of caring for others.
